University of California, Davis Off-Campus Jurisdiction

Campus policy provides that Student Judicial Affairs may exercise jurisdiction over conduct which occurs off-campus when the alleged behavior indicates the student "may be a threat to the safety or security of members of the University community or University property, functions, or facilities" or the alleged misconduct involves academic work or any records, documents, or identification of the University. Conduct that threatens health or safety has been defined to include, but is not limited to, (a) rape or sexual assault; (b) any other physical assault; (c) threats of violence; (d) conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person; (e) stalking; (f) sexual harassment; (g) possession, manufacture, use, or distribution of weapons, explosives, or destructive devices; (h) possession, manufacture, use, or distribution of alcohol or other controlled substances (in violation of law or policy; includes minor in possession, providing alcohol to minors or obviously intoxicated persons, drunk in public, possession for sale or manufacture of drugs, growing marijuana, driving under the influence, etc.); (i) hate crimes; (j) hazing; and (k) other serious misconduct which jeopardizes the safety or security of persons or property, for example, conduct which would constitute felony burglary, robbery, theft (including identity theft), or credit card fraud.

In determining whether to exercise off-campus jurisdiction, the campus considers the seriousness of the alleged offense, the risk of harm involved, whether the victims or witnesses are members of the campus community, and/or whether the off-campus conduct is part of a series of actions which occurred both on- and off-campus.

SJA asks to be informs of incidents or crimes which occur off-campus if the alleged perpetrators are UC Davis students and the alleged incident either (1) fits any of the above criteria or (2) occurs at a fraternity, sorority, or other living group of a student organization.

| 102.00 | Chancellors may impose discipline for violation of, or an attempt to violate, any University policies or campus regulations. Violations or attempted violations include, but are not limited to, the following types of misconduct: | 102.10 | Stalking behavior in which an individual willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly engages in a knowing course of conduct directed at a specific person which reasonably and seriously alarms, torments, or terrorizes the person, and which serves no legitimate purpose. |
| 102.01 | Academic misconduct, including cheating, plagiarism, or other academic misconduct. | 102.12 | Hazing or any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a campus organization, or any activity by the organization or its members which causes or is likely to cause bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm to any student or to another person. |
| 102.02 | Other forms of dishonesty, including fabricating information or knowingly furnishing false information or reporting a false emergency. | 102.16 | Failure to identify oneself to, or comply with directions of, a public official acting in the performance of his/her duties, or resisting or obstructing public officials in the performance of or attempt to perform their duties. |
| 102.03 | Forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification. | 102.17 | Unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of controlled substances. |
| 102.04 | Theft, conversion of, or destruction or damage to property, or possession of stolen property. | 102.18 | Manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of alcohol which is unlawful or otherwise prohibited by policy. |
